A superstition is an irrational fear of what is unknown or mysterious. It is founded on ignorance and illiteracy. People all over the world seem to have superstitions. Certain hours are believed to be auspicious and certain hours inauspicious. Charms and amulets are worn as protection against evil spirits. A comet in the sky is believed to herald the death of a great person. The hooting of an owl is supposed ominous, and so is the whining of a dog in the dead of night.

It is considered inauspicious to travel towards the north on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, and

towards the south on Thursdays. Some persons do not pay or lend money on Tuesdays and Fridays; they fear that they will be reduced to poverty if they do. Sneezing is regarded as a bad omen; if anybody sneezes before a journey is to be begun or some important work is to be started, it is postponed. If a cat crosses the way when a person is proceeding on important business, he fears that he will not succeed.

In many European countries number thirteen is considered unlucky, and so many hotels do not contain rooms numbered 13. They believe that if 13 people sit at a dining table, one of them will die in a few days.

It is unfortunate that superstitions still persist in spite of the advancement of science. All superstitions are obviously baseless and absurd and prevent us from making progress in life. Man is a rational being. He should not allow the clear stream of reason to lose its way into the dreary desert of superstition.

8. The Use and Abuse of Leisure

Leisure is perhaps as important as work. When we work continuously for several hours we feel very tired and, unless we have some break,



we cannot carry on and our health may be injured. After a little relaxation, we can work more energetically and more efficiently.

We should take care to make the proper use of leisure. Those who are engaged in manual work should, in the leisure, do the kind of work which exercises and entertains the mind. Those who do mental or brain work—for example, students, teachers, writers—should spend their leisure time in physical and athletic activities. Pursuits different from our regular business provide adequate relaxation.

There are various hobbies for us to pursue in our leisure hours: stamp-collecting, drawing, photography, music, gardening, and so on. A hobby is a pursuit in which one is really interested and therefore proves to be an excellent recreation. Evening walks, particularly in congenial com-

pany, can also be a relaxation, in that they provide opportunities to refresh ourselves in the open air and enjoy the beauty of nature.

Unfortunately, however, many of us have a tendency to abuse leisure. They spend their leisure time in drinking, playing cards, betting on horses and so forth. We should avoid unhealthy amusement. To sit idle is another way of abusing leisure. Idle hands are liable to do mischief. An idle mind is the devil's workshop. We should therefore be occupied with something recreative in our leisure hours.

12. Travel as a Part of Education

Travel, in the younger sort, is a part of education; in the elder, a part of experience.

—Francis Bacon

We can acquire a great deal of knowledge from books. But it is only second-hand knowledge. By travelling we come into direct contact with things that we wish to know. Our knowledge of a distant land gained from numerous textbooks cannot stand comparison with that which a month's travel there would give us. Travel gives a character of experience to our knowledge.



By travelling we not only gain knowledge but broaden our nature. Like the frog in the well, the man who sticks to his home has a narrow vision of the world. As Shakespeare says, "Rather see the wonders of the world abroad than, living duly sluggarized at home, wear out thy youth with shapeless idleness." In the places we travel about we are able to encounter men of different temperaments, customs and habits and learn to deal with them. We also learn to adapt ourselves to new manners and customs. We cultivate caution, forbearance and tact. And that is one of the chief aims of education.

Travel also helps us brush up our knowledge of a foreign language. If, for example, we travel about England for a few weeks, we shall be able to speak English better through our contact with native speakers.

20. My Favourite Hobbies

When we have worked continuously for some time we need relaxation. To pursue hobbies is the best way of relaxing. My favourite hobbies are gardening, stamp-collecting and photography.

I have loved gardening since my boyhood. I enjoy watering my garden every morning and evening. It gives me enough physical exercise and sends me back to my work with renewed zest and vigour. It is very amusing digging up fresh beds for new plants. I grow flowers as well as vegetables. I beam with satisfaction when I cast my eyes on my luxuriant garden. The sight of the lively garden is increasingly refreshing.



My second hobby is stamp-collecting. I have collected hundreds of stamps. I have arranged them in five books. My uncle, who often goes abroad on business, has been helping me to collect rare stamps. He sends me foreign stamps from the places he visits. Whenever I have a little leisure, I sit down at a table with my precious stamp-books, arranging new stamps in them and writing in the names of countries. Each stamp has a story to tell me of distant lands and strange peoples. Looking through the stamps, I can follow the history of nations.

I also love photography. Whenever I go for a picnic or on an excursion or travel round a strange place, I take my camera with me and snap interesting objects. I have a number of valuable snapshots, some of them highly recreational.

35. Some Wonders of Modern Science

Science has been making great strides particularly for the last five or six decades. Man has worked miracles in the field of science and there seems to be nothing that he cannot achieve.

The most important recent inventions have been in the field of electronics and computers. Computers perform complex calculations in a fraction of the time that would have been needed in the past. Aircraft and ships use computers to monitor things like geographical position and fuel consumption. The Internet, which links millions of computers worldwide, allows people to share information and communicate with each other. The Net has become a vital resource for of business, education and entertainment.

Electronic devices have made robots a reality. Many factories now have robots that do several



tasks such as painting and welding. Engineers have also developed 'intelligent' robots, which can act as guards and firemen, and may travel into space to distant worlds.

For hundreds of years man had dreamed of travelling in space. That dream came true in 1961: a Russian, Yuri Gagarin, was the first man to travel in space. In 1969 Neil Armstrong became the first man to set foot on the moon. Hundreds of people have travelled in space, but unmanned space flight is much more miraculous. Unmanned craft are equipped with instruments to send television pictures and scientific information back to earth. They travel through the solar system and beyond, photographing planets.

Not many years ago, information could be



carried from one part of the world to another only by cables under or over the ground, or be broadcast from radio transmitters. Today satellites are used in the world-wide network of

telecommunications. Communications satellites are placed in orbit above the earth so that they can bounce radio signals from one part of the world to another. It is satellites that enable us to see on television events that are happening on the other side of the world a fraction of a second after they take place.

Rapid developments in modern medicine have conquered many diseases and disorders. The latest developments include body scanners, which can produce a detailed picture of the interior of the human body. Radio-therapy is often used to cure cancer. Today surgery is so advanced that surgeons can repair or replace organs such as the

kidneys and the heart. Man has conquered nearly everything except death.

36. Educational Possibilities of Broadcasting

Broadcasting is one of the most beneficial scientific achievements. Besides being a source of various types of entertainment and recreation, it has a very important role in educating people, more particularly the masses.

The word "broadcasting" refers to both television and radio programmes. Broadcasting is the system of making and transmitting TV and radio programmes.

Particularly television has become one of the world's most important sources of information and opinion. It brings the world into our homes every day. Current affairs programmes, documentaries and chat shows are usually educative.

Speeches, discussions and symposia on a wide variety of subjects are broadcast regularly. Such broadcasts are of great educational value. For example, an ophthalmologist introduces us to the structure of the eye and suggests precautions to be taken against eye diseases; a dentist points out the care of the teeth; a scientist expounds the theory of relativity; an educationist criticizes the present educational system and suggests measures for its improvement; a group of literary critics discuss the various aspects of Mulk Raj Anand's work; a scientist, a sociologist, an economist, a politician and a philosopher give their views on a topic of current interest from different perspectives.

Lessons based on school curriculums are also broadcast on some channels: they are of immense value to students.

The BBC World service broadcasts a wide variety of programmes. We ought to watch the BBC broadcasts regularly: they expose us to the English of native speakers and help us to increase our proficiency in English.

City life is a great boon to young boys and girls in particular; they have the benefit of excellent schooling. Besides, the city itself is a school for studying life. In a city one comes into contact with men of different types, manners and customs.

Kareem : Yes, city life has certain advantages, too. I ought not to be so allergic to it.

EXERCISE 160

7. The pros and cons of lotteries

Tom : Just my luck ! I have bought as many as fifty lottery tickets, but haven't got a single prize.

Jack : How unwise of you to buy so many lottery tickets ! Why do you waste



your money on lotteries?

Tom : I don't think I am wasting my money. If I get a prize, I shall become rich. If I don't, I console myself with the thought that my money is going to be used for the welfare of the destitute.

Jack : Your case is different; you have decent income. What about those who are tempted to buy raffle tickets in spite of their very meagre

income—for example, servants, scavengers, rickshaw-pullers? Do you imagine how many poor men starve to enable themselves to buy raffle tickets?

Tom : As a matter of fact, I also feel the pinch of it, in spite of my decent income. I have been spending about sixty rupees on the average every month on lotteries. I have never

won a prize.

Jack : It's true the money saved through lotteries is used for the welfare of the poor, but lottery is not better than gambling. It can have a demoralizing effect. It gives the impression that one need not work at all to become rich.

Tom : So it does. It has never occurred to me that lottery is an evil.

EXERCISE 161

2. Is poverty a handicap?

Kishore : Why does Mr. Joshi look so unhappy? He is a millionaire and has no cause to worry.

Ashok : Do you think those who have plenty of money can be happy and get a lot out of life?

Kishore : Yes. They can get whatever they want and make their life as comfortable as possible.

Ashok : That's what most of us suppose. We don't realize that the rich are usually unhappy. We wrongly think poverty is a handicap. Many rich men wish

they were poor so that they could be free from care and from social envies and jealousies. How sweet and happy the house of the poor is! How loving and united its members are in the common interest of supporting the family! There is more genuine satisfaction in life in the humble cottage of the poor man than in the luxurious mansions of the rich. Moreover, the rich are more prone to vices than the poor. Poverty is not a handicap, but a blessing.

Kishore : Your words remind me of what Jesus said to his disciples: "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God!" Many strong, eminent men have sprung from the ranks of the poor.

EXERCISE 162

Patient : Good morning, doctor! Can you spare me a few minutes?

Doctor : Certainly! Come in and sit down. Now, what is the matter with you?

Patient : I've caught a cold, and I'm constantly coughing.

Doctor : You aren't running a temperature, are you?



Patient : I suppose I'm not.

Doctor : Let me examine you...Your heart and lungs seem to be all right. Now open your mouth wide...Now breathe in deeply through the nose...There doesn't seem to be anything radically wrong with you. But you are a little run down. Take a complete rest. Get these tablets at a chemist's. Take two tablets twice a day. You should be all right in three or four days.

Doctor : Not at all.

We may not be able to give them large quantities of wealth, to favour them with high positions, or to give them perfect health. But we are endowed with the capability to con-

sole those who are in distress, pardon another for doing wrong, and resist taunts. God has ordained that happiness in life shall depend on these factors and misfortunes vanish when one has a true friend.

The nightingale, which was awake, sang her love-song throughout the night. Her song was so engaging that silence did not mind being disturbed. 10. If a person suffers misery as a result of his virtue, he deserves reverence. If his misery is due to some ill luck, he deserves sympathy. If it is due to vice he ought not to be affronted because his misery itself is perhaps a punishment proportional to his evil conduct. The nature of the man who censures a criminal about to be executed is not worthy of praise.

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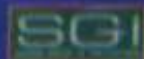
